

>>>>>> A Discovery of 100 Years of Life at Sea

A maritime museum on the site of the former Royal Naval Dockyard located in the River Medway in Chatham Kent, Southeast England.

It was established in the mid-16th century and has provided 500 navy ships to the Royal Navy for 414 years. Chatham Royal Naval Dockyard was the forefront of shipbuilding industry and maritime technology.

A celebration of Britain's maritime heritage, visitors can step aboard the three historic warships namely: HMS Gannet, a Victorian navy sloop, HMS Cavalier, second world war destroyer and HMS Ocelot, a cold war submarine.

Exploring the steel and submarines will provide knowledge of maritime life during the 19th and 20th century.

Visiting the quarter mile Ropery is a discovery of the life of the Victorian Rope Makers. Ropes for British ships are made since 1618.
